



GUELBENZU

The Cistercian order moved from France to Navarra, Spain and established two Monasteries and an Abbey in the 12th century.

The placement of these Cistercian Monasteries formed an equidistant Triangle – thought to be the inspiration for this symbol of Triangle and circle adopted by the illuminati and the Masons.

One of the Monasteries in Fitero Navarra est. 1140 AD founded the order of Calatrava – an order of fighting monks linked to the knights Templar.

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Don Miguel Guelbenzu founded the original family estate in Cascante, Navarra in 1850 and the first winery called “la Casa Rosa” was a Masonic building. In 1851, Guelbenzu showed their wines at the great London Universal Exhibition they won Gold and went on to win prestigious wine award in Bordeaux in 1882.

Leaving Navarra for Northern Aragón

In 2000, the Guelbenzu family discovered and acquired the entirety of a unique quaternary gravel deposit called La Lombana, a short ways up the Queiles River Valley in the village of Vierlas.

This ancient piece of land predates Dinosaurs in Europe and looks like a large ship with a flowing river below and the 7,600 foot Sierra del Moncayo nearby. It is a windy area with extreme temperature shifts, Intense heat in the summer and harsh snowy winters.

The 113 acre vineyard is planted it with a complex mix of red varieties, including Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Syrah, Tempranillo, Graciano, Petit Verdot, Garnacha and recently planted Alicante Bouschet.
